Week				Topic						
1	Introduction to Syntax; Course Requirements; Students' Evaluation: In the first week, students will be introduced to the basic concepts of syntax, including an overview of syntactic theory and the study of sentence structure in the English language. Course requirements and evaluation criteria will be explained to ensure students are well-prepared for what to expect. The importance of understanding syntax for effective communication will be emphasized, setting a foundation for the topics that follow. 2	Sentence Structure: Constituents and Phrase Structure: The concept of sentence constituents will be introduced, focusing on how sentences are broken down into smaller units called constituents. 3	Sentence Structure: Functions - Subject, Predicate, Noun Phrases, and Verb Phrases: The discussion will center on sentence functions, specifically focusing on the subject and predicate, as well as noun phrases and verb phrases. Students will explore the dependency and functional relations, such as the modifier-head and complement-head relationships. Exercises will help reinforce these concepts through practical analysis of sentence components. Reference: Syntax: A generative introduction (2006), pp. 57-84									
4	different parts respective sul analyzed in do how they con	Sentence Structure: Categories - Parts of Speech and Their Subcategories: Students will explore different parts of speech, including adjectives, adverbs, and prepositions, along with their respective subcategories. The functions of these word classes in sentence formation will be analyzed in depth. This week will focus on understanding how these categories form phrases and now they contribute to overall sentence structure, accompanied by exercises for practice. 5	Sentence Structure: The Basic Verb Phrase: The basic structure of verb phrases will be discussed, particularly focusing on the complements of lexical verbs. Various verb categories will be examined, and students will be engaged with exercises to better understand how verbs and their complements function within a sentence to convey meaning accurately. Reference: Analyzing sentences: An introduction to English syntax (2016), pp. 75-98
6	More on Auxiliary Verb Phrases: This week, students will examine the role of auxiliary verbs in forming complex verb phrases. Topics will include the distinction between lexical and auxiliary verbs, the different types of auxiliary verbs (such as modal, perfect, progressive, and passive), as well as their functions in tense, aspect, and voice. The role of auxiliaries in passive, negative, and interrogative constructions will also be analyzed, with in-text exercises for further understanding. Reference: Syntax: A generative introduction (2006), pp. 85-114
7	Review and Practice: Students will engage in a comprehensive review and practice session, where they will revisit topics covered from Weeks 1 to 6. Exercises and discussions will reinforce their understanding of sentence constituents, functions, categories, and verb phrases, allowing them to clarify any doubts before the midterm.

9	Adverbials and Other Matters: This week will focus on adverbials, including adjunct adverbials and their role within verb phrases. Topics such as the mobility of adverbials, phrasal verbs, ellipsis, and sentence adverbials will be discussed. Emphasis will be placed on understanding the syntactic positions of adverbials and how they modify verbs, adding depth to meaning in sentences. 10	The Structure of Noun Phrases: The structure of noun phrases (NPs) will be examined in detail, including determiners, pre-determiners, and pre-modifiers. Topics such as quantifying adjectives, participle phrases, and noun modifiers will be discussed, along with post-modifiers. This week aims to help students understand how different elements combine to modify nouns and the syntactic functions they serve. Reference: Understanding syntax (2020), pp. 51-80
11	Sentences Within Sentences - Complementisers and Clauses: Students will learn about the use of complementisers like "that" and "whether," and how they function within sentences. The roles of complement clauses within verb phrases, adjective phrases, noun phrases, and prepositional phrases will be explored. Additionally, adverbial clauses and their functions will be analyzed, helping students understand more complex sentence structures. Reference: Syntax: A generative introduction (2006), pp. 115-140
12	Wh-Movement: This week will focus on the concept of wh-movement, including wh-questions, subordinate wh-clauses, and interrogative clauses. Relative clauses and the distinction between restrictive and non-restrictive clauses will also be covered. Students will analyze the syntactic role of wh-words, and exercises will reinforce these concepts through practical application. Reference: Analyzing sentences: An introduction to English syntax (2016), pp. 146-170
13	Non-Finite Clauses: Non-finite clauses and their forms will be discussed, including how non-finite verbs function within sentences. The various functions of non-finite clauses—as subjects, modifiers in noun phrases, adverbials, and complements of verbs—will be examined. Students will work through exercises to identify and understand the use of non-finite structures in different contexts. Reference: Syntax: A generative introduction (2006), pp. 141-165
14	Students' Presentations: Students will deliver presentations on topics related to English syntax. This will help them consolidate their understanding of course content, as well as develop their analytical skills and ability to explain syntactic concepts effectively. The presentations will serve as a way for students to demonstrate their grasp of the topics discussed throughout the course.
15	Review and Practice: A final review and practice session will be conducted to cover all the key topics discussed in the course. Students will have the opportunity to revisit challenging concepts, practice more exercises, and prepare for the final exam.
